322 SUMMER JOBS HELPING YOUTH SUCCEED:

This summer, our government delivered over 76,000 Canada Summer Jobs, with 322 right here in Scarborough—Guildwood—Rouge Park. With more positions than usual, many youth gained valuable work experience with local employers across a variety of fields, from conservation and sports to coding, research, and more.

I saw firsthand how they took pride in their roles, gained new skills, and built meaningful connections that will last beyond the summer. For some, the experience even led to full-time job offers—proving how impactful this program is for both youth and employers.

Young people face real challenges finding work. As your representative, I will continue working to expand opportunities for youth year-round, because when young people succeed, our whole community benefits.

Auto Theft Down Nearly 26% in Ontario:

In addition to fewer thefts, recovery rates have improved with more stolen vehicles being traced, intercepted, and returned to their rightful owners.

There is more to be done. The RCMP and CBSA will continue supporting local police, and I am working closely with my provincial counterparts and police chiefs to build on this progress. As Minister of Public Safety, I remain committed to keeping all Canadians and their communities safe.

TOUGHER BAIL AND SENTENCES FOR VIOLENT CRIME:

This fall, our government will introduce legislation to make it harder for violent criminals to get bail and to impose stricter sentences. This will include offences involving auto theft, home invasion, human trafficking, and organized crime.

But in order for these changes to have a meaningful impact, the provinces also need to do their part to

Auto theft in Ontario dropped 25.9% in the first half of 2025, and is down 19% across Canada. This sharp decrease reflects a comprehensive effort to crack down on organized crime and protect communities. By tightening security at our borders and ports, imposing tougher penalties on offenders, and equipping law enforcement with the tools they need, the federal government is delivering results.

fix the bail system. The provinces are responsible for administering bail hearings, jails, and crown prosecutors' offices. Yet provincial jails remain partly overcrowded with people awaiting trial, and provincial courts and crown attorneys often lack the staff, funds, and resources to effectively contest bail and get cases tried in a timely manner. Without sufficient provincial support and

resources, even the toughest federal legislation cannot fully protect communities.

We all have a role to play in keeping our streets safe. The federal government stands ready to work with provinces to close these gaps and ensure our criminal justice system functions properly.

STANDING STRONG AGAINST U.S. TARIFFS:

On August 1, the United States raised tariffs to 35% on Canadian goods not covered under the Canada-United States-Mexico Agreement (CUSMA). While nearly 90% of Canadian exports are shielded from tariffs under CUSMA, key sectors such as lumber, steel, aluminum, and automobiles have been hit—putting Canadian jobs and industries at risk.

The United States has justified its latest trade action by pointing to the cross-border flow of fentanyl, despite the fact that Canada accounts for only 1% of U.S. fentanyl imports and has taken strong action to curb even those limited amounts.

This remains an unprecedented threat—and we are not standing still. We are acting decisively and focusing on what we can control:

- Canada will continue to negotiate with the U.S. to secure the best possible deal for Canadians.
- Pivoting to reliable trading partners and diversifying our trade—the U.S. share of Canada's exports has already declined from a monthly average of 76% in 2024 to 68% in 2025.
- Removing federal trade and labour mobility barriers to create one Canadian economy.
- Targeted support for impacted sectors and workers.
 We are protecting jobs, investing in our industrial competitiveness, buying Canadian, and diversifying our export markets.

He met his lovely wife Diane at St. James Town Sailing Club in the mid-1990s, where Larry served as club commodore and as commodore of the federation of community

boating clubs located in the Toronto outer harbour.

Larry earned a BA in Public Administration from U of T Scarborough in 1979 and a Masters of Business Administration (MBA) from York University in 1983. Larry has been an Certified Management Accountant (now a Chartered Professional Accountant) since 1989. Larry has worked in the corporate world (TD Bank) and


social services (VP of Finance at WoodGreen Community Services) and now works as an Assistant Director in the finance office at U of T Scarborough, bringing his career full circle.

Let's look at just some of Larry's community work, to understand how Kevin and Reza knew that Larry would be a perfect candidate to be recognized.

Larry has served on the board of WRCA since 2013 and served as president from 2014 – 2017. Larry has been

doesn't. But there's also a lot to love about Scarborough, even if we have suffered from chronic underinvestment by all levels of government for a long time. SCRO works in collaboration with other civil society organizations in Scarborough, including the Scarborough Business Association, Rotary clubs, residents associations, and ethno-specific organizations to help build a more powerful and cohesive Scarborough. SCRO builds relationships with politicians, senior public servants, and



thought leaders to make Scarborough a "squeaky wheel" when public policy and public investment decisions are being made.

An exciting part of SCRO's work is the Scarborough Walk of Fame, which celebrates some of Scarborough's most accomplished current and former residents. Larry is immensely proud of SCRO's work in this regard and encourages all Scarborough residents to go see our Walk of Fame, located in Centre Court at the Scarborough Town Centre. SCRO is now planning the next Walk of Fame Celebration Day in April 2026.

Next, Larry has been incredibly involved in Rotary for over 25 years. Rotary clubs are dedicated to community service and raise money for community programs. Larry is a member of the East York club and, for the past seven years, has served as the treasurer of the local Rotary District, which supports 60 Rotary clubs from Etobicoke to Picton. This position allows Larry to be involved in the training and development of volunteers and to build connections between clubs and club leaders as well as helping to manage the business side of Rotary's work.

Finally, for the past seven years, Larry has served on the board of directors of Options for Homes and its parent organization, Home Ownership Alternatives, two non-profit organizations which work together to make home ownership more affordable for households with moderate incomes by building condos on a not-for-profit basis. Larry's work with these organizations gives him immense satisfaction. He calls these organizations "social purpose businesses", as they operate on a financially self-sustaining business without a lot of public funding.

So what does Larry think of the honour? Perpetually humble, simply he states, "It's nice to be recognized." Indeed.

P.S. What is the King Charles III Coronation Medal? According to the Government of Canada website, it is given to individuals who have made a significant contribution to Canada. It is a circular medal, silver in colour and 32 mm in diameter.

How Many People Would Dedicate Their Time on National TV to Honour Veterans?

Remembering Don Cherry's Unwavering Tribute to Canada's Heroes

For nearly four decades, Canadians tuned in every Saturday night to Coach's Corner—not just for Don Cherry's colourful suits or unfiltered hockey takes, but for something far more meaningful. In our fast-paced world of highlights and hot takes, Cherry carved out precious airtime to do something few broadcasters would dare, he honoured Canadian veterans.

Each year, as Remembrance Day approached, Cherry used his national platform—broadcast into millions of homes coast to coast—not to promote himself, but to pay tribute to the men and women who served and sacrificed in war. With solemnity and pride, he spoke directly to the camera, reminding Canadians of the price of freedom and the importance of remembering those who gave everything.

This wasn't a public relations (PR) gesture. It was deeply personal. Cherry's father served in the First World War, and his respect for Canada's military ran through everything he did.

While others in the media hesitated to blur the lines between sports and patriotism, Cherry did so unapologetically. He saw no division—only duty.

At a time when attention spans are short and content is carefully filtered, Cherry made space for remembrance. He showed photos of fallen soldiers, thanked troops by name, and encouraged young Canadians to learn about their country's military history. His words weren't scripted, they were from the heart, and perhaps most importantly, he urged Canadians to wear a poppy, not because it was trendy, not because it was performative, but because it mattered. It matters.

"The least you could do is spend a couple bucks on a poppy," Cherry once said, voice cracking with frustration and sincerity. It was a simple request, but one rooted in respect and national pride—a call to remember, not just with words, but with action.

In today's world of polished messaging and curated silence, Cherry's unapologetic tribute to veterans stands out more than ever. Whatever your views on his broadcasting style, his unwavering commitment to honouring our fallen deserves recognition.

So this November, as poppy boxes reappear across the country, ask yourself: how many people would dedicate their time on national TV to honour veterans? Don Cherry did—every single year.



Cricket

Cricket – insects or what?

Some of my buddies have asked what is this sport that you play with a bat and ball? Glad you asked! It is essentially an international game, not really attributed to any country in particular, though it owes its origin to an informal game played by shepherd boys on the downs of southeast England. Some surviving written evidence traces back to Bede's life of St. Cuthbert,circa 1120-30 BCE, showing him holding the ball in front of his face. A picture from the archives, courtesy Will's book of Cricket, shows some history.

Cricket's past has many events, suspense, contradictions with a gritty ability to bounce back despite wars and political interference. Amidst all this, the emphasis has been on excellence, skill and artistry and this gentleman's game has now evolved into being played vigorously and skillfully by both men and women.

The first international match was played between the USA and Canada in 1844. There are three formats – test cricket being the longest played over five days, ODI or one day international with 50 overs each and T20 which is just twenty overs for each side and is the shortest format.



Initially, it was played mainly in England, India, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand, the West Indies, Jamaica and Pakistan. Currently, it is played in almost every country and gaining in popularity globally.

Equipment includes: two upright sticks (wickets) as well as three and small bridges on the wickets called bails. The batsman is to guard against the bowler knocking out the wickets or send the bails flying. If the batsman hits and the ball goes up and he's caught, the batsperson is out. There are eleven players on each

team, and the rest of the team are on the field to block the batsman from making runs.

Cricket is gaining in popularity with some great women's teams. Kent in the UK was one of the earliest locations for the origins of cricket and is governed by the International Cricket Council.


The space is limited to what one can share about cricket for the novice. Maybe, this can be continued but it cannot be ended before mentioning – some of the earlier greats like Doc Grace (William Gilbert Grace MRCS LRCP (18 July 1848 – 23 October 1915) who was an English cricketer widely considered one of the sport's all-time greatest players. The supreme

maestro Don Bradman of Australia, Baron Constantine, established an early reputation as a promising cricketer and was a member of the West Indies teams that toured England in 1923.

All-rounder Sir Gary Sobers, from Barbados and the little master Sunil Gavaskar from India. It would be impossible to mention all of the greats as there are too many. But these players laid the foundation for some good cricket techniques.

Check out events locally and globally to watch some great cricket! Follow up the game with some iced tea or lemonade or better still visit a game at Lord's to see the Ashes, in England or an international cricket match anywhere it is being held.

Canada's first national urban park turns 10

CANADA'S FIRST NATIONAL URBAN PARK TURNS 10



With the Governor General's royal assent and an order-in-council from cabinet, Rouge National Urban Park made history as it became Canada's very first national urban park on May 15, 2015.

Spanning 79.1 km² (and counting), the Rouge is now one of the largest and best-protected urban parks in the world. From the rolling hills of the Oak Ridges Moraine — a vital source of drinking water for the Greater Toronto Area — to the sparkling shores of Lake Ontario,

the park features an awe-inspiring diversity of landscapes, including forests, meadows, wetlands, rivers, and large tracts of some of Canada's most fertile farmland.

Rouge National Urban Park is also the first federally protected area in Canada to protect agriculture alongside nature and cultural heritage — a living, working landscape where farmers, wildlife, and history all thrive together.

With 20 percent of Canada's population living within reach of the Greater Toronto Area, Rouge National Urban Park is uniquely positioned to connect more people than ever to nature.

First Nations' connection to Rouge

The 10-year mark of Rouge National Urban Park is a meaningful milestone that builds on more than 10,000 years of continuous human history and Indigenous presence and stewardship in the region.

In October 2011, prior to the establishment of the park, Parks Canada undertook an engagement process with 10 First Nations communities with an expressed interest and historic and cultural connection to the area. Parks Canada works collaboratively with First Nations partners on every aspect of the park's management and operations, including archaeological fieldwork, restoration projects, events, interpretation and creative co-design.

50 YEARS OF ADVOCACY

The creation of Rouge National Urban Park is a testament to the power of grassroots action.

In the 1970s, concerns about urban expansion inspired residents to form Save the Rouge Valley System (SRVS), to

protect the Rouge from the pressure. Their vision gained momentum in 1988 with a bold plan to establish a larger protected area. By 1990, the Province of Ontario committed lands to create Rouge Park, backed by a \$10 million federal investment.



Momentum only grew from there. In 2011, the federal government announced the development of the Rouge into a national urban park that would formally be established by Parks Canada in 2015. Thanks to decades of advocacy, partnership with First Nations and collaboration across all levels of government, the Rouge's forests, wetlands and farmland are now protected for future generations.

LAND ASSEMBLY

Bringing together Canada's first national urban park is a bold and complex undertaking. Over the past decade, Parks Canada's team, working with all levels of government, conservation authorities and the public, have pieced together Rouge National Urban Park one section at a time.

Land assembly at this scale — involving over 300 individual properties, major agreements with eight different government bodies, and countless easements, leases and infrastructure

corridors — is unprecedented, especially in the heart of Canada's largest urban centre.

The Rouge team continues to work to realize a once-distant dream: protecting nature, culture and agriculture in Canada's



most populated region. Today, Rouge National Urban Park stands as a living legacy as one the largest and most unique urban parks in the world — which now stands get even bigger!

EXPANDING FOOTPRINT

This year, on January 27, hundreds of farmers, residents, advocates, elected officials and reporters flooded into Pickering Golf and Country Club, all drawn by the promise of a historic announcement. Cheers, tears and applause filled the hall as MP Jennifer O'Connell said: "There will be no airport on the Pickering lands!"

The announcement marked a milestone in the decades-long push by local stakeholders to protect the area.

A new path forward is now in motion, with plans to transfer



much of these long-contested lands of high conservation value to Parks Canada, significantly expanding Rouge National Urban Park. While the road to the Rouge's completion just got a little longer, the dream that generations fought for is closer than ever.



10 THINGS TO LOVE ABOUT THE ROUGE

1. RESTORATION WITH PURPOSE

Ecological integrity is the top priority in Rouge National Urban Park. Restoration

efforts here are deeply integrated, supporting wildlife movement, improving habitat connectivity, enhancing soil health for tenant farmers and protecting native species. To date, Parks Canada and its partners have completed 137 restoration and farmland stewardship projects, including the planting of more than 300,000 native trees and shrubs.

2. THE ROUGE AESTHETIC

Rouge National Urban Park doesn't just look different—it feels different. The park proudly uses "urban park plum" (Pantone

512) in its design palette and collaborated with Indigenous design studio Brook McIlroy and the First Nations Advisory Circle on a unique graphic design catalogue. The new Common Look and Feel initiative weaves Indigenous place-keeping into signs, structures and exhibits, visually reinforcing Indigenous presence on the landscape.

3. 10,000 YEARS OF HUMAN HISTORY

Long before Toronto had traffic jams, the Toronto Carrying Place Trail was one of the most important transportation routes in what is now southern Ontario. This historic portage



trading route connected Lake Ontario to Lake Simcoe and the upper Great Lakes. Indigenous Peoples used this trail for thousands of years and later European fur traders followed the

path. The Rouge still holds traces of this powerful legacy, including Bead Hill, the only known intact 17th-century Seneca village and burial site in Canada. This site and others reflect continuous Indigenous presence and connection to the land.

4. GROWN IN THE ROUGE

Rouge is home to over 9,000 acres of agricultural land — about half the park!

Here, tenant farmers tend to the soil and a variety of crops while partnering with Parks Canada on restoration and conservation efforts that align food production with ecosystem health. New long-term leases are giving farmers the stability to invest in improvements and ecological stewardship.

5. SURPRISE BEARS

Yes, black bears have been spotted in the Rouge! Their return is a powerful sign that conservation efforts are working to expand habitats and connect wildlife corridors in the park



and adjacent parcels of protected areas. Rouge National Urban Park is a surprising biodiversity hotspot, with over 2,000 species recorded — including more than 1,000 plants, 247 birds, 73 fish, 44 mammals and 27 reptiles and amphibians.

That includes 42 species-at-risk, making the park a vital refuge for wildlife in the heart of the Greater Toronto Area.

6. HEALTHY PARTNERSHIPS

Since 2016, Parks Canada has partnered with Scarborough Health Network to deliver Mood Walks, a program supporting youth in the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Program. These guided hikes help participants connect with nature and promote mental well being.

7. HISTORIC HIKES

More than 200 years ago, lumberjacks cut a trail through Rouge forests to fell towering white pines for the masts of British naval ships. Those logs were floated down the Rouge River to Lake

Ontario, then sent along the St. Lawrence to shipyards across the Atlantic, where they became masts on ships that helped the British defeat Napoleon. Today, remnants of that path make up parts of the Mast trail, one of the park's most challenging hikes.

8. WETLANDS WITH A JOB TO DO

The Rouge watershed is a lifeline for the region. Its rivers and wetlands filter water, reduce flooding and offer prime habitat for birds, amphibians and fish. Rouge Marsh is the largest and most intact coastal wetland in Toronto and plays a vital ecological role in the heart of Canada's biggest city.



9 BLANDING'S TURTLES ON THE REBOUND

The endangered Blanding's Turtle is making a comeback



thanks to a long-running reintroduction program in partnership with the Toronto Zoo. Hatchlings are raised for two years before being released into the park, giving them a head start on survival. Now, some of the earliest released turtles have

reached maturity and should soon lay eggs of their own, a hopeful sign for the future of this beloved species.

10. SMART WASTE, CLEANER PARK

Rouge National Urban Park is a testing ground for innovative waste solutions. Underground Moloks and Haul-Alls keep garbage out of sight and smell, while Clear Your Gear receptacles collect fishing line and hooks. A new cigarette butt recycling program targets one of the most persistent forms of litter, helping keep wildlife safe and park ecosystems clean.



Crime and Safety: Building Confidence

Preparedness is about small steps that reduce opportunities for criminals. By pausing, verifying, and keeping control of your belongings, you make yourself a much harder target.

While no one can stop every attempt, there are many simple steps you can take to make distraction crimes less likely to succeed. Be prepared, alert, and confident in how to respond.

EVERYDAY AWARENESS HABITS

- **Pause before opening your door** by using a peephole, window, or camera to see who is outside.
- Keep valuables secure by carrying wallets, purses, and phones close to your body and zipped or buttoned.
- **Limit what you carry** by only bringing essential cards and cash when going out.
- **Stay alert** in busy spaces by being mindful of your surroundings in stores, at ATMs, or in parking lots.

VERIFYING IDENTITIES

- Utility or service workers, ask to see official photo ID. Call the company directly before letting anyone inside.
- **Unexpected visits,** genuine officials will understand if you prefer to reschedule or verify.
- **Doorstep rule of thumb**, if you did not book the appointment, you do not have to open the door.

AT HOME

- Lock doors and windows, even when at home, many distraction crimes exploit brief moments of inattention.
- Use security features such as a doorbell camera or chain lock allows you to communicate without opening fully.
- Do not allow strangers to separate you from your home, if they ask you to check your yard or garage, keep your front door locked first.

IN PUBLIC & NEAR VEHICLES

- **Stay in control** of your belongings by using cross-body bags or keeping wallets in front pockets.
- **Be cautious** of "urgent" requests as scammers rely on making you feel rushed.
- At ATMs, shield your PIN and be wary of people standing too close.
- **In parking lots**, before responding to anyone about your vehicle, lock it and keep valuables out of sight.

HOW NEIGHBOURS CAN HELP

- Watch out for each other, if you see someone being pressured at their door, in a parking lot, or on the street, check in or call for help.
- Share suspicious sightings such as strangers going door-to-door without ID, loitering near ATMs, or creating unnecessary urgency should be noted.
- Check in with seniors or newcomers as they are often most at risk from distraction crimes and benefit from reminders and support.
- Be visible as thieves prefer quiet, empty streets.
 Simply walking outside or greeting a neighbour increases natural surveillance

West Rouge remains one of the safest neighbourhoods in Toronto, and together we can keep it that way. By pausing before acting, verifying identities, protecting our belongings, and looking out for each other.

Wendell Gibbs: Faith, Family and the Future

It is with tremendous elation that West Rouge Life announces that our very own Reverend Dr. Wendell Gibbs has received the King Charles III Coronation Medal.* An incredible honour. So deserved!

Who is Rev. Dr. Wendell Gibbs? The Reverend Doctor is a man of great faith, a person devoted to family (of all kinds) and a truly forward thinking individual. We are so lucky to have such a man in our community. He is a person who embodies all the qualities of a great Canadian: kindness, community-building, being a positive example to others, generosity and being there when it counts.

Rev. Dr. Wendell Gibbs is currently the Senior Pastor at the First Baptist Church Toronto. He has held this position since 2010. He is the church's forty-fifth pastor and their second longest serving. The church is the oldest Black institution in Toronto. Pastor Gibbs has a wife named Rosil and two adult children. The profound love he has for his family is evident when he speaks of them; he is immensely proud of his children's accomplishments both academically and spiritually. Pastor Gibbs was born in Trinidad and Tobago before immigrating to Canada. He has a Master of Divinity and a Doctor of Theology. Pastor Gibbs says his mother raised him with, "great faith and great strength."

Pastor Gibbs serves as a volunteer police chaplain with the Toronto Police Service. His work with the police service has been transformative to both him and the communities he serves. Not only does he provide spiritual care to police officers of all faiths, but he also organizes Prayer Walks as well as a plethora of other important community events (when we spoke, he had just attended the flag raising on Emancipation Day, August 1st). The Prayer Walks are especially important to Pastor Gibbs; on April 11, 2024, he participated in a Prayer Walk that was attended by all 16 Divisions of the Toronto Police Service. Faith leaders, police and community members all walked together to pray and keep the streets safe. He also had the honour of attending the 59th National Prayer Breakfast with then Prime Minister Justin Trudeau.

Another important facet of Pastor Gibbs life is his love of sport. He has been involved with the Scarborough Basketball Association as well as being the Director of the West Rouge Soccer Association. Both of his children are athletes; his first grandson will follow in the family's footsteps, no doubt.

Pastor Gibbs has travelled to many African nations (e.g., Ghana, Nigeria and Rwanda just to name a few) to lead A Peace of Life, a Youth Peace Camp, focusing on empowering youth in Africa. Pastor Gibbs lights up when he speaks of the camp, the message, and the youth in Africa, and how important it is for him to have the opportunity to empower them. The camp has Christian and spiritual focus, but fun and sport are incorporated throughout. The day I interviewed Pastor Gibbs, he was on his way to Rwanda for the eighth time! Absolutely amazing.

On top of everything else, Pastor Gibbs is a street captain here in our lovely West Rouge. He says, "be a neighbour" and when he says this, he's talking about taking an active role in your community to make it a place where people feel as though they belong and thrive. He believes in "unity through community" which is not necessarily a religious message, but one of respect for others. He says, "we are all made equally, so we should all be cared for equally." Beautiful words.

Congratulations, Pastor Gibbs.


